

## AMERICAN HERITAGE

#### THE LOUISIANA PURCHASE

On the 30<sup>th</sup> of April 1803 one of (if not *the*) biggest real estate deals in the history of the world went to closing, the final papers not being signed for another two days. A tract of primarily undeveloped land consisting of approximately 828,000 acres was sold for the unbelievable sum of less than 3 cents per acre, which added up to a tidy sum of \$15,000,000.00, to a fledgling nation that lacked the funds in its coffers to cover the agreed upon sum.

The owner of the land was France, led by a brilliant, but volatile and ambitious man named Napoleon Bonaparte. In order to accomplish his self imposed mission of conquering all of Europe before he died he needed a rapid influx of cash and the troops necessary to occupy France's ports and territories in the New World.

In 1795 the U.S. had signed a treaty with Spain which allowed merchants and farmers sending their goods down river for export to maintain "Right of Deposit." This meant that goods would be stored in New Orleans duty free. In October of 1802 the French revoked the right; a circumstance that sent the Americans into a tailspin

of concern and anger. Various proposals for seizing the port and wresting it from the French were proposed, nearly propelling the nation into another war

Jefferson's solution was to offer to purchase New Orleans. He instructed his envoys with several possible negotiations and gave them a limit of \$9.375 million. His choices of agents were Robert Livingston, his ambassador to France, and James Monroe.

Monroe declined at first. He was hoping to retire from his position as governor of Virginia and open a law practice,



but Jefferson persisted and Monroe sold many of his own valuable possessions in order to raise money for his passage and maintenance abroad. He never recovered from the debt, despite a \$30,000 congressional appropriation for his sacrifices.

In France Bonaparte refused to take the advice of his brothers, Lucien and Joseph, to rethink the sale proposal and treated them to quite a tantrum. Lucien says in his memoirs that the brothers visited Napoleon at the Tuileries Palace, where they found him in a rose scented bath. Joseph made it known that he would lead the opposition to the plan and Napoleon drenched him by falling backwards in the bath. Joseph, disgusted, left to change and Lucien continued to try to reason with his power mad brother. He says that he stated, "If I were not your brother I would be your enemy." Napoleon's response was to smash a snuffbox onto the floor, ending the encounter.

During negotiation Bonaparte shrewdly saw an opportunity present itself and offered the entire territory, boundaries unspecified, for the total of 11.25 million dollars and the forgiveness of France's \$3.75 million debt. Madison and Livingston agreed and the deal was done, although the U.S. was pressed to borrow from two European banks at a rate of 6 per cent interest. The loan was finally repaid 20 years later at a final cost of \$23 million.
